This past Saturday, **The Garden Club of Dobbs Ferry** in cooperation the Village held a wonderful ceremony dedicating the new *Blue Star Memorial Marker* which is now placed at the Flag Plaza at Waterfront Park. What a great event it was! Especially to see so many residents and staff in attendance.



The Blue Star Memorial Program honors men and women who have served, are serving or will serve in the armed services of the United States. At the close of World War II, National Garden Clubs were seeking a suitable means of honoring our service men and women. Their goal was to develop a program that would provide a living memorial to help beautify and preserve the country these men and women fought for rather than to provide a stone monument in

their honor. Today, The Garden Club of Dobbs Ferry has added to the "Ribbon of living memorial plantings traversing every state."



New businesses and investments are clear signs of a new energy and

#### vitality taking place in Dobbs Ferry.

In 2010, the downtown business districts had a vacancy rate of almost 35%; key properties laid wasted and empty, re-investment and building upgrade was literally non-existent. Assessed valuations were deteriorating, and year-on-year tax rates were high. Contributing to this picture more than anything was a lack of growth and balanced redevelopment, which was unfortunately doing great harm to Dobbs Ferry's future.

However, since 2010 a *more positive and balanced philosophy towards re-development* has been in place, and the results are clear: *Dobbs Ferry's downtown district is thriving* with *new restaurants* and *foot traffic*; projects and proposals to *restore and upgrade* dilapidated, old and empty properties are moving forward, or before the village under careful review; a*ssessed property valuations have gone up* for the first time in many years, and year-on-year tax rates have been the lowest in the village's recent history, breaking the negative trends of prior years.

Businesses, investors, and new homeowners are now choosing Dobbs
Ferry as the place they want to be; as tax payers we are much better off
for that because it will make our community better, more affordable, and more
sustainable into the future.

Re-development is also critical to generate the funds and resources needed to *improve key village buildings and infrastructure* - which for too many years fell into disrepair - and which now require a major overhaul. One-time development and permit fees (non tax payer \$ dollars) have helped the village's segregated recreation account reach record high amounts - which can now be re-deployed to achieve meaningful, long-term upgrades to village

buildings, and improvement to other assets helping to support a higher quality of life for all residents. Without re-development, nothing will ever be upgraded.

## **Slow Down Rivertowns**



The *Slow Down* **Rivertowns** initiative was formally rolled out with the 7 Westchester villages -including Ardsley, Dobbs Ferry, Elmsford, Hastings, Irvington, Sleepy Hollow and Tarrytown - together announcing a coordinated initiative by Police Departments to promote traffic and pedestrian safety throughout the villages.

**Slow Down Rivertowns** will work to raise community awareness and encourage safe driving through education and enforcement. Police Departments will coordinate efforts to discourage speeding, distracted driving, impaired driving and other New York State Vehicle and Traffic Law violations

that endanger the safety of pedestrians, cyclists and other motorists.

Departments will also engage with local schools and institutions to promote educational and safety awareness.

In Dobbs Ferry this will also include cooperation and awareness/educational programming between the DFPD and the Dobbs Ferry School District, as well the large institutions in town such as Mercy College.

The Villages together want to encourage everyone to join this initiative by setting positive driving and pedestrian examples. Police action can't solve everything. It starts with drivers ... *Slow Down* **Rivertowns**, it is not worth it to be in a hurry.

New Municipal Parking Resources
Created at Lower Cedar Street

The Village has completed the work and striping for ~ 24 new municipal parking spaces at the west end of Cedar Street (near the old DPW facility). A new fence has been erected as well to enhance the area. These spaces are dedicated for Central Business District Parking. **Blue meters** will be installed at each space over the coming weeks.





**UPDATE:** Trustees says 75 Main Street proposed rear building is *too big.* 



At the BOT's most recent public hearing the trustees unanimously opined that the proposed project for 75 Main Street was simply too big to approve.

Quoting the Mayor:

" If it does not fit, we must not accept it ".

No vote was taken because the developer indicated it would propose a revised/smaller project. A strong majority of the board agreed it is in the best interests of the whole community to keep the process open to see if a smaller project could materialize for this important property and historical building. If/when a new plan is proposed, the board will reopen the Public Hearing and review process.


